Fiscal Ct., City •Help Red Cross

Each Pledges \$6000-a-Year Chapter Fund

The American Red Cross may soon boast a Floyd chapter again, following recent commitments by the Floyd fiscal court and Prestonsburg city council to help fund it.

In response to requests by Cassie Allen, Prestonsburg attorney who has coordinated local Red Cross efforts since the organization's regional chapter folded last year for lack of support, the city council and fiscal court have each pledged \$500 a month toward the cost of maintaining a county chapter, estimated at \$1300 a month. The city of Martin will be asked to contribute the remaining \$300 a month, Mrs. Allen said.

The attorney fended off a move by magistrate Ed Caudill to have one person appointed to the new chapter board from each magisterial district. "We already have by-laws (governing selection of board members)," Mrs. Allen said. "We want it to remain nonpolitical."

A Price man who is already serving a three-year prison term for robbery received an additional 10-year sentence on a similar charge last Thursday.

Assistant Commonwealth's Attorney Albert A. Burchett told a Floyd Circuit Court jury that Wiley Keith Pennington, 19, and Ted Reynolds, 26, beat and stripped a 37-year-old Martin man and robbed him of \$450 on April 15 last year.

James Chaffins hired Pennington to drive him home from a Jacks Creek residence that day but was taken instead to Mud Creek where Pennington and Reynolds punched him about the head and face, took his trousers, wallet and shoes, and left him bleeding by the side of the road, the Commonwealth's attorney alleged.

By agreement with the prosecutor, Reynolds pleaded guilty to an assault charge and received a two-year sentence in exchange for his testimony against Pennington. Public Defender Robert Bishop, representing Pennington, criticized the arrangement as "a sweetheart deal" and told jurors that Reynolds' testimony was unreliable. Chaffins initially told police he did not know who assaulted him, said Bishop, who suggested that Reynolds and an unidentified "buddy" had committed the crime. In naming Pennington as his accomplice, Reynolds had "picked out the

name of an innocent man," the defense attorney claimed. But Chaffins identified Pennington in

court as one of the two men who beat (See Story No. 3, Page 4)

Closing Date Is Set For Floyd Schools Floyd schoolchildren are head-

Floyd schoolchildren are headed for the final stretch this week with Friday the last day of school for book-weary pupils. For teachers, Monday, June 11 will be the closing day at all schools except McDowell Elementary, Floyd Fiscal Court last week approved a budget that provides for substantial salary increases for magistrates in the new fiscal year, but two members of the court said they will vote against the raise when it comes up for a decision later this month.

The 1984-'85 budget, which must yet be approved by the state Department of Finance, provides for a 7.65 percent costof-living adjustment for the four magistrates, whose last raise was in January, 1982. It would boost a magistrate's annual salary from the present \$20,843 to \$22,438. In addition, each magistrate automatically receives \$3600 a year for expenses.

Students Score Gain in Averages

Floyd eighth-graders scored somewhat lower than the national average on standardized tests administered in March but appear, generally, to have moved closer to the national norm since they were tested a year ago.

In a battery of tests known as the Comprehensive Test of Basic Skills (CTBS), the performances of 723 eighthgraders were measured in reading, language, math and other skills. Scores rted in 10 categories—two in reading, three in language skills, two in math, and one each in reference skills, science and social studies-in terms of the percentage of Floyd students scoring at or higher than the national median for their grade. Over seven categories usually reckoned as indicative of competence in the 'basic'' skills, 42 percent of Floyd students scored at or above the national median, compared with 36.1 percent of the same students last year. Last year, these students' scores ranged from a low of 32 percent (in vocabulary) to a high of 48.2 percent (in math comprehension). This year the low point was 36.4 percent (in reference skills) and in two categories—language expression (53.5 percent) and social studies (51.8 percent)—the Floyd students came out slightly ahead of the national median.

Multiflora rose was introduced to this section by state and federal agriculture departments. It was recommended as "a living fence"—and how right they were! Only a rhinoceros in a hurry to get somewhere would dare venture into its thorny clumps. We were encouraged to plant it, and we did. We were given a bum steer, and, to stretch the figure, we swallowed the steer, hide, hoofs and horns.

So what? Is it a problem the individual farmer must attempt to solve alone, or one to live with till the countryside is lost?

A few have attempted multiflora control or eradication at their own expense. But we do not think they should. We are

East Kentucky Drilling Plans Said Scuttled

"A grand design" drilling program that was scheduled to begin June 15 in the development of about a million acres of oil and gas leases in Floyd and other counties of the area may not be begun at all.

The Arco Exploration Co., a subsidiary of Atlantic Richfield, of Dallas, Texas, said Arco isn't interested in renewing with Melinworth Financial Securities the contract which expired April 16, according to Buddy Beck, an Arco spokesman.

Labin Donald Hock, chairman of Melinworth, termed the Arco decision "a breach of contract," and indicated that his company is considering legal action.

Owner of Mine, Others To Face Hearing Panel

The mine owner, a supervisor and two miners involved in the operation of a mine in which a Teaberry man died earlier this year have been ordered to appear before a state panel to see if their certifications should be revoked.

Willard Stanley, commissioner of the state Department of Mines and Minerals, said the July 14 hearing by the Miner Education and Certification Board will be the first in which regular miners have been ordered to attend. Usually, only supervisory personnel are called to appear.

Jerry Ray Johnson, 27, was killed in a roof fall in the Newsom Coals, Inc. mine near Galveston on April 16. According to state mining records, the roof fall occurred when a newly blasted area hadn't been properly supported with roof bolts or timbers. "The men knew there was a roof plan and we want to know why they were in that mine knowing it wasn't being followed," Stanley said.

Johnson, a foreman at the mine, was operating a scoop at the time of the accident.

The Sargent No. 19 mine on Branham's Creek, where Johnson died, had a long history of violations of mining regulations. Inspectors had visited the mine nine times this year before the (See Story No. 5, Page 4)

Magistrates Gerald DeRossett and Ed Caudill indicated they will oppose the raise when it comes to a vote, perhaps on June 15, the date of the next fiscal court meeting. They would rather see the money go to wage increases for county road workers or toward hiring more road workers, they said.

Floyd is one of 24 Kentucky counties paying magistrates more than \$10,000 a year for what is generally regarded as a part-time job; it is one of only six counties—the others are Pike, Perry, Leslie, Jefferson and Daviess—that pay more than \$20,000.

The salary of the judge-executive, which—like that of the sheriff, jailer and county clerk—is set by the state, will rise on July 1 from \$29,485 to \$30,605, plus \$3600 a year for expenses. The position of judge-executive is generally reckoned as more nearly a fulltime job.

The proposed raises could be made retroactive to Jan. 1 of this year, a choice provided for in the new budget.

Insurance Agencies Blame Handling of Flood Claims

Don't blame them—blame the feds—is what local insurance agents are telling angry clients. Because federal officials are taking care of insurance claims stemming from the recent floods and, by many accounts, are making a poor job of it.

The trouble began May 10, three days after the worst flooding here, according to Dick Clark, vice-president of the Hall-Clark insurance agency. That was when the flood became an officiallycertified disaster and directors of the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) set up a claims office in a Pikeville motel.

Until then, local agents were handling flood claims routinely for their clients, assigning them to local adjusters. Clark said he had 80 claims reported by Wednesday, a day after the river crested, when federal officials announced they were taking over all insurance claims and the call went out to adjusters all over the country to help with the workload here.

Since then, as Clark and other local insurance agents tell it, they have found it virtually impossible to get information out of the federal claims office; they feel frustrated that they are unable to help their clients, and they are taking the brunt of criticism for problems over which they have no control.

"Runaround" is a word frequently used by agents and their clients to describe their treatment by NFIP staffers—as in a letter fired off by Clark to U.S. Congressman Carl D. Perkins last week. "It is a shame that (insurance) agents in eastern Kentucky were given such a runaround by the National Flood Claims representative in the recent flooding," he wrote. "When it takes more than one week to set up claims offices and in some cases two weeks or more to contact the flood victims, there has to be something wrong with the program."

Even now, four weeks after the flood struck, some victims are still waiting for an adjuster to assess their damage. Juanita Clifton, of Dwale, is one. A disabled widow, she lost her hot water tank, washer and dryer in the flood and reported the loss "just as soon as the water went down." An adjuster came to her neighbor's; none has yet visited her. Calls to the NFIP office in Pikeville have yielded nothing but busy signals, she said.

In Hueysville, Sarah Alice Reffitt fretted for her sick husband during last week's unseasonably chill mornings. The flood made their furnace inoperable and there is no way they can replace it until the insurance is settled. It took Mrs. Reffitt two days to get through to federal officials and then it was "hold, hold, hold," she said.

She pays a \$134 annual premium and will sue if she does not get results soon, Mrs. Reffitt vowed last week. The NFIP office promised to have an adjuster out to see her this week.

In Emma, the whole community is still waiting to see an adjuster, lamented Huey Darby, a partner in the Darby and Allen agency. "The government's really messed up on this," he said. "They've goofed and they ought to admit it." Darby said he thinks federal officials seriously underestimated the extent of flood damage here.

While most report that adjusters are courteous and fair when they finally (See Story No. 7, Page 4)

Blue Cross-Blue Shield Move To Limit Hospital Charges

Blue Cross and Blue Shield of Kentucky has announced changes in its hospital reimbursement program which will limit future rate increases from member facilities. The changes were outlined in a letter mailed to all 113 acute care hospitals in Kentucky.

Under the revised agreement, increases effective on or after July 1 will be limited to a hospital inflation index projected by Rate Controls, a national health care publication. The changes are designed to further contain payments made to hospitals on behalf of all Blue Cross and Blue Shield subscribers and their families.

Said G. Douglas Sutherland, Plan president: "We have an obligation to negotiate the best buy for our members. This change in reimbursement to contracting hospitals represents our continuing effort to play a leadership role in managing the cost and utilization of health care services on behalf of our subscribers. This can be accomplished while providing necessary levels of reimbursement to hospitals so they can maintain available services and quality care."

Hospital price increases in Kentucky averaged more than 11% last year while the Rate Controls "marketbasket" index averaged 7%. Overall hospital reimbursement, including the price and use of services, increased 19.8%. These program revisions represent an effort to achieve a significant savings on behalf of Blue Cross and Blue Shield members who require hospital care.

Other major components of the program include:

-A cooperative utilization review program which will enable the Plan to monitor patterns of care throughout the vear. ly those bad debts created by Blue Cross and Blue Shield patients. The Plan will continue to recognize its share of charity care and charges not fully reimbursed by the Medicare and Medicaid programs.

I promise myself this night as I journey down the long winding road of life, the love and appreciation instilled in me from this experience will be resonantly shared, not only with my fellow man, but rather, with every living creature on God's earth. The littlest things I have too often taken for granted shall from this day forward be of the most significant importance to this man.

Hopefully, my words spoken from experience will reach the many young people who might this night, be comtemplating committing a crime. If only one young person is helped, then my letter is not in vain. Crime doesn't pay, and I stand as evidential proof. I pray this night that I am one step closer to my journey's end, and that my letter stops another from traveling this same journey

Whistler's Mother Would Have Smiled

It was 1855 and the young artist, James McNeill Whistler, not quite 21, resigned from his job as a draftsman for the U.S. Coast and Geodetic Survey in Washington, D.C., and sailed off to London.

Whistler never was to see his native land again.

Like other Americans who headed for the art capitals of Europe in the 19th century to refine their training and soak up the nourishment offered by civilizations that had long supported the arts, Whistler enjoyed the easy, unconventional way that artists could live in cities like London and Paris.

Whistler spent the rest of his life making a name for himself in those cities. but America still claims this expatriate painter as its own. Born in Lowell, Mass., on July 11, 1834, Whistler is linked inextricably with the immortal painting of his mother. That solemn image, however, belies the artist's calculated and outrageous personal style and overshadows the artistic innovations that characterize his oil paintings, watercolors, pastels and decorative schemes. Today, art historians acknowledge Whistler's works as precursors of 20thcentury modernism.

The man most responsible for bringing Whistler's legacy back home was his friend and patron, Charles Lang Freer, a Detroit industrialist whose collection of Whistlers now is housed in the Smithsonian's Freer Gallery of Art in Washington, D.C. In a fitting observance of Whistler's 150th birthday, the Freer is presenting a major showing of 300 works from this collection. The exhibition, sponsored by AT&T, will fill most of the Freer from May 11 through Dec. 1, 1984.

Whistler and Freer couldn't have stood farther apart on the scale of human personality. Freer was decorous, circumspect and tactful, an excellent businessman. Whistler was volatile and controversial, afflicted with a quality that his biographers, Elizabeth and Joseph Pennell, called "a sort of transatalantic impudence." His profligate spending kept him in perpetual debt and at one point led him to bankruptcy.

But in March 1890, when Freer, in a rare, impulsive moment, first called upon Whistler in his London studio and met the man whom he had known only through his etchings, the self-made millionaire discovered a rapport with the artist: Freer and Whistler agreed about art.

"Whistler's art was too subtle for most people of his time," says Dr. David Park Curry, curator of American art at the Denver Art Museum. Curry organized the Freer's exhibition and wrote the accompanying catalog. "Whistler's art theories were abstract at a time when Britain still worshiped realism and 'the human form divine.

Freer understood subtlety, however, and he began to collect Whistler's etchings as appropriate embellishments for a grand, but tastefully understated, home he was building in Detroit. As Freer's collecting interests expanded to include the artist's works in a full range of media, Whistler wired transatalantic gratitude: "...I think I may tell you without the least chance of being misunderstood, that I wish you to have a fine collection of Whistlers!!! Perhaps the collection. Freer turned out to be one of the few people whom the acerbic Whistler did not eventually alienate, and the two remained friends until Whistler's death in 1903. Frederick Richards Leyland, the artist's first important patron, was not so lucky. Leyland hired the painter to help decorate his elegant London town house, an arrangement that ended in a maelstrom of misunderstanding when Whistler carried the embellishment too far.

spent abroad, the young artist returned to the United States, having developed in the meantime a noticeable flair for youthful insubordination. He sashayed through West Point, flouting dress codes and narrowly missing dismissal for bad behavior, then dashed his mother's hopes that he would follow a military career by failing chemistry. On the job at the Geodetic Survey, Whistler gained admiration for his drafting skill, but the margins of his renderings of coasts and shorelines were sometimes decorated with elegant-and illicitdoodles.

In Europe, Whistler quickly became a recognizable fixture among the bohemians of Paris and London, with his 'gleaming eye-glass, and his shock of curly black hair, amid which shone his celebrated white lock," as the Pennells wrote of their friend.

"Whistler was one of those somebodies you always notice," Curry says, recounting French Impressionist Edgar Degas' facetious comment to his already dandified, capeclad companion, "Whistler, you have forgotten your muff.

"Whistler used controversy and showmanship to keep his name floating in the public consciousness," Curry says. "He was one of the first modern artists to understand the cult of the personality as a public relations trick. He knew that notoriety would attract attention to him and his art. But it hurt him in a sense, because it served to trivialize some of the most interesting art of the 19th century.

In fact, Whistler's quiet paintings of London at night, which the painter appropriately called "nocturnes" for their harmonious loveliness, were revolutionary in a society that still praised heroic "history paintings." One of his night paintings of fireworks at Cremorne Gardens, a London amusement park, got him into trouble when the conservative art critic, John Ruskin, hurled insults at painting and creator: .. For Mr. Whistler's own sake, no less than for the protection of the purchaser, (dealer) Sir Coutts Lindsey ought not to have admitted works into the gallery in which the ill-educated conceit of the artist so nearly approaches the aspect of willful imposture. I have seen and heard much of cockney impudence before now, but never expected to hear coxcomb ask 200 guineas for flinging a a pot of paint into the public's face.

Whistler sued Ruskin for libel and received a symbolic farthing in damages-clearly not enough to stop a financial slide that was finally arrested by a profitable commission to do a set of etchings of Venice. He had gained early fame for his prints of London's grimy but lively East End, and his graphics continued to receive accolades.

The paintings, however, were little understood. Portraiture was a lucrative pursuit that Whistler eagerly sought, but many of his greatest portraits profited him little, featuring likenesses of the mistresses he kept before his marriage

Leyland never forgave Whistler for covering the leather or for the copious newspaper stories that Whistler generated and even encouraged during the course of the decoration.

Many years later, as fate would dictate, Freer was to purchase the Peacock Room, now commonly recognized as a herald of Art Nouveau. The room can be seen in the Freer Gallery.

Whistler's penchant for arousing strong feelings can be traced back through his youth. Following a childhood

show up, some-like Richard Crisp, of Banner-wonder if outside adjusters fully appreciate the damage done by the acid waters of an eastern Kentucky flood. And Wilce Rose, who sells and services refrigerators, agrees. "I've been through four floods," he said this week, 'and this one has been more acid than any I've seen." Acid will later cause damage that an inexperienced adjuster would not now detect, he said.

Rose is critical of adjusters for not allowing flood victims to replace freezers and refrigerators that were immersed in flood water. Unlike older appliances, which you could take apart and fit with new insulating material if necessary, there is no way to replace or sterilize contaminated insulation in the newer models, he argued. "They're doing people wrong," Rose said.

Goldie Lafferty, of Prestonsburg, has a letter from NFIP headquarters in Lanham, Md., warning her that her claim may be denied if she fails to file proof of loss within 60 days. If you want proof, she suggests, watch her trekking over to a neighbor's house each day to cook while she waits for the settlement that would allow her to replace her stove

Or check out Glenna Mae Stumbo, who lost all the carpet in her McDowell home a week before she made the final payment on it. "I'm just borrowing money from people to buy a little bit here, a little bit there. I have no money to do anything with. It's all making me a sick person," she said.

If federal officials communicated better with them, local agents would be better able to help or reassure their clients, Dick Clark argues. It might also help if NFIP claims offices were responsible for a smaller area, he said, noting that the Pikeville office is expected to serve five Kentucky counties, six in Virginia and seven in West Virginia.

Denzil Allen, of the Hatton-Allen agency, wants to see a fact-finding committee set up, made up of federal officials and local insurance agents. The panel should look into the causes of the current confusion and make recommendations to see that it is not repeated, he said.

This year's is the first major flood in this area since the federally-administered flood insurance program, originally created by Congress in 1968, was restructured and expanded in 1979. Claims will need to be handled faster in the future if public confidence in the program is not to collapse, insurance agents here contend.

What federal officials think of criticism of the program could not be learned this week. Repeated calls to Joseph Seisman, supervisor in the Pikeville NFIP office, went unanswered Monday. On Tuesday, a staff person there referred a reporter to NFIP's Maryland headquarters. The public information director there referred the inquiry to a senior marketing officer in the Federal Insurance Administration in Washington, D.C. He was unavailable at press time.

Pay Raises Not Justified

Floyd county's new budget, as submitted to the state Department of Revenue for approval, proposes to raise magistrates' salaries to \$22,438 a year, plus the usual \$3600 each for travel expenses.

We have no official data at hand to show how much time these four officials spend in performing their work for the county, but the office of magistrate in Floyd county is generally considered only a part-time job. That job involves hours and stresses of which we are not aware, we must admit, but we do know that some of the duties magistrates formerly performed no longer exist.

The magistrate, for example, is no longer a judicial officer. He does not issue warrants of arrest, or handle minor civil actions, or set bail bonds or preside at trials. He may serve in an advisory capacity, but under a comparatively new law cannot even supervise road construction or repair. Thus his official acts are pretty well restricted to the once-a-month meetings of the fiscal court.

Floyd county is one of only six counties among the state's 120 that pays its magistrates or commissioners \$20,000 a year or more. Ninety-six counties-including Boyd and its city of Ashland, Clark with the city of Winchester and McCracken and the city of Paducah-pay their magistrates or commissioners less than \$10,000 per annum.


Frankly, The Times does not believe Floyd county has that much money to spend on these salaries, and, with all due respect to the men who hold these offices, we do not think such pay is justified.

Two of the four magistrates-Gerald DeRossett and Eddie Caudill-have already said they oppose the proposed salary increase, citing the need for county highway employees to be paid more and the possible need of even more workers at a time when winter and flood have left many roads in miserable condition. That is no great sacrifice on their part, since they already are paid more than \$20,000 a year, but their opposition to another raise is a start in the right direction.

It is possible that the other magistrates will join them in this bit of self-denial. Certainly we hope they will.

The county is required by law to pay the expenses of Coroner Roger Nelson, County Attorney Arnold Turner, Jr. told the court. Nelson complained that the fiscal court had failed to honor \$2300 in claims for expenses incurred in the course of his duties. 

Hock said that when his company's representatives were called last week to Dallas for a conference with Arco, they thought details of the contract would be worked out. Instead, he said, Arco threw us out of their office.

Beck said, however, that he didn't know anything about anybody being thrown out of an Arco office.

The rather involved train of negotiations for drilling in the area began with Arco contracting with a New Jersey operator to fund drilling, but he later turned his contract over to Melinworth. In mid-May Arco was quoted as saying it was considering the New Jersey operator's proposal to transfer his interest in the project to Melinworth. On May 8 Melinworth announced an agreement in principle with Atlantic Richfield, Arco's parent company, "to drill and explore on" about 1 million acres in Eastern Kentucky.

The leases included lands in Floyd, Lawrence, Magoffin, Johnson, Martin, Pike, Knott and Perry counties.

It seems as though the Handgun Control Coalition and all of the anti-gun forces won't be happy till all law-abiding citizens throw in the hat and give up their guns

At first they just wanted to ban the socalled Saturday Night Specials. (Even though they didn't tell anyone that their definition of a Saturday Night Special included most all handguns). Then they wanted a ban on just handguns that were the easiest to conceal (you can bet that would include all handguns as we know them today). Now they are going after our handguns in a new and different way. They want a ban on what they call the "cop-killer bullet," even though there has never been even one single law enforcement officer killed with this notorious bullet. It was actually designed for big game hunting where maximum penetration was needed, such as with big bear and the largest African game animals

It seems as though the only people who would ever prosper from a ban on handguns would be the criminals themselves. It wouldn't be the law-abiding citizens, on that you can be sure. The next time you see your grandparents, ask yourself if they were unarmed or if there were no chance of them being armed, how many times a criminal would have to think about breaking in on them or even your own family. Handguns may not be the answer to crime control but it's all we have today and I think we better hang on to our guns as long as we have crime and I don't think crime will stop today, or tomorrow, or next week, or next year. Guns are the largest crime deterrent we have.

Criminals in several surveys by the Justice Department as well as some independent surveys say that they aren't afraid of the police, or the courts, or even our jails, but will avoid any contact with persons who have guns for fear that they may be shot while committing a crime. I urge everyone who may read this that they should write to their legislators and voice their strong support for our right to keep and bear arms. **RICHARD G. PRICE**

The trial of a former bookkeeper in the Floyd Circuit Court clerk's office on theft charges will be held in Lawrence county; trial of a Martin couple for murder has been again postponed, and an appeal has been lodged in the case of a man recently ordered to serve a sixyear-old prison sentence

Attorneys for Delores Calhoun asked for a change of venue on grounds that her former employer, Floyd Circuit Court Clerk Frank DeRossett, has daily contact with court officials here. The Commonwealth agreed to a venue change to avoid any appearance of prejudice against Mrs. Calhoun, said Assistant Commonwealth's Attorney Albert A. Burchett.

Mrs. Calhoun has been charged with failing to account for \$21,915 in funds for which she was responsible between 1979 and 1981, when she handled money paid into the district and circuit courts and the driver licensing office. Trial was originally scheduled here for this week but a venue change was granted May 24. No new trial date has yet been set.

Trial of Alvis Randall Frasure and Linda June Wilson, charged with murder in the death of Larry Wilson at a Buck's Branch home last May 29, has been postponed to next January 7, in order to give new defense attorneys time to prepare their case.

The trial was initially set for last Dec. 28 when it was postponed on account of snow and rescheduled for May 28. But defense attorney Dan Jack Combs has subsequently taken office as a judge of the state appeals court, and a new lawyer will have to take over the case. Attorney Gary Johnson last week filed a notice of appeal in the case of Gary

Lee Castle, who was ordered recently to begin serving an 11-year sentence for robbery that had been imposed, but not carried out, six years earlier. Johnson said his client was a victim of double jeopardy in that he was tried on two charges-assault and armed robberyarising out of a single incident.

Moreover, the fact that Castle's sentence was delayed so long through no fault of his own means he was denied due process of law, the attorney argued.

Student Aid Funds At Pikeville College Reach Record Level





Long-Distance Calls

long distance calls within the state through specialized long distance telephone companies. The state Public Service Commission

has opened the long distance market within Kentucky to competition by ruling that toll competition would best serve the phoning public and reduce the monopoly on in-state toll calls held by ATTCOM, an AT&T subsidiary.

The Commission issued its order May 25 on an administrative case opened in January. The case has explored various aspects of telephone toll competition, reimbursement fees for companies to use the existing telephone network, and methods of regulating competitive markets.

Since the break up of the Bell system last year, ATTCOM has provided all long distance service in Kentucky among the three local access and transport areas (LATAs). Long distance service within each LATA is provided by local telephne companies, including South Central Bell.

Under the Commission's order, specialized long distance carriers may now apply to provide toll service among the three service areas. Three companies-MCI Telecommunications Corp., Western Union and GTE Sprinthave already applied to the Commission for certificates of convenience and necessity to provide long distance service within the state.



(Continued from Page Three) at age 54 or pretty but anonymous young women who caught his eye as he walk ed through his Chelsea neighborhood.

His most famous painting, "Arrangement in Grey and Black: Portrait of the Painter's Mother," was begun on a day when one of those women failed to show up, and he asked Anne Whistler, who was staying with him in London, to strike a standing pose. The longsuffering, aged lady "stood as a statue ... two or three days," as she wrote to her sister, until Whistler finally took pity on her and painted her "sitting perfectly at (her) ease." Both Whistler and his mother were over joyed with the results, with Mrs. Whistler ascribing the "attractive charm" of her expression to "a Mothers unceasing prayer.

In 1891, Whistler must have felt a glowing sense of revenge when the portrait, which had been ridiculed by some critics, was bought by the French government. Since 1926, it has hung in the Louvre. Today, most people appreciate the painting for its subject matter instead of for the complex arrangement of shapes and tones that concerned Whistler

On hearing the news of its purchase, Freer wrote to Whistler's wife: "This significant recognition of Mr. Whistler's art speaks in many ways and comforts many hearts-and although of universal interest, it is as peculiarly gratifying to all good Americans as it must be extremely disappointing to the few remaining scalpless followers of Ruskinism.

Freer, who had once advised a business associate not to fire a subordinate, offering the comment that "Genius is always erratic," never seemed flustered by Whistler's reputation for touchiness. When faced with a problem in obtaining a work of art that he wanted to buy from the artist. Freer advised his frustrated intermediary to "forget the man and remember his art."

Could any artist wish for a better remembrance?





1413 Seek Aid Here **Following May Flood**

As of June 2, some 6,464 Kentuckians--including 1413 in this county-have sought disaster assistance as a result of the storms, flooding and tornadoes of May 6-16, according to Paul E. Hall, federal coordinating officer for the Federal Emergency Management Agency

Most of the applications for assistance have been made for Small Business Administration loans-2,628; temporary housing-3,866; and individual and family grants-4,997. In addition, 802 claims have been filed for disaster unemployment assistant, and 2,997 people have consulted the Internal Revenue Service concerning tax refunds for property losses

In Floyd county, 992 have applied for temporary housing, 1192 for individual and family grants, 565 for personal or home loans, 158 for business loans, 1040 for tax breaks and 284 for unemployment assistance.

Beginning Monday, June 4, representatives of Small Business Administration, temporary housing, and individual and family grants began visiting Floyd county each Monday, to take new applications for assistance, and to help previous applicants with their forms. They will be the Department of Social Insurance office here from 10 a.m. to 4:30 p.m

-Applications can be mailed directly to the Small Business Administration, P.O. Box 1618, Paintsville, Ky. 41240.

-At the present, applications for individual and family grants are being processed and maintained at the Department of Social Insurance office until completed. Applicants are urged to make sure their file is complete, know what papers are required and if necessary, give the papers to the verification officer who visits them; (utility bills, etc.), and as necessary, proof of any repair and clean-up bills, estimates for minimum repairs to make home liveable, and estimates for minimum repairs to make home liveable, and estimates for bridge repair, or replacement.

Also, temporary housing is still actively seeking to rent private and public mobile home pads, as well as houses and apartments. Those who know of available rental property are urged to call the disaster hotline number.

Diaster victims have until July 16, to apply for assistance. Additional information may be obtained by calling the toll-free disaster hotline, 1-800-422-1044. Operators are on duty from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Saturday, and 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Sunday.



Taxpayers May Amend 1983 Returns To Cut 1984 Flooding Losses

Taxpayers with 1984 personal and business flood losses in locations declared as federal disaster counties by the President may claim losses on their 1983 or 1984 Kentucky income tax returns.

To claim losses on 1983 returns, taxpayers must file an amended income tax return (Form 740-X) and attach a copy of Federal Form 4684. To expedite a refund, write "1984 Flood Loss" on top of the amended return. 1984 flood losses in other counties must be reported on 1984 income tax returns.

Each casualty loss must be reduced by the amount of insurance reimbursement and government aid received.

Requests for copies of 1983 tax returns destroyed in the flood must be made in writing and sent to P.O. Box 1190, Station No. 70, Revenue Cabinet, Frankfort, Ky. 40602. The request should be handwritten by the taxpayer and must include the name on the original return, the social security number and the taxpayer's signature. If additional tax was paid with the original return, send the validating number stamped on the front of the cancelled check.

Most Social Security benefits to dependents or survivors of retired, disabled, or deceased workers end if the person divorces or marries, Jim Kelly, Social Security district director for the Big Sandy area, said recently. But benefits to disabled widows and widowers, age 50-59, and to widows and widowers 60 or older can continue upon remarriage. However, all changes in marital status must be reported to the

Social Security Office. This same rule applies to disabled surviving divorced spouses 50-59 and to surviving divorced spouses 60 or older, Kelly said.

Benefits to a child getting checks because he or she is under 18, or 19 if a student, or disabled will generally end if the child marries. Checks to a spouse getting benefits on the record of a retired or disabled worker will end if the marriage ends in divorce unless the spouse is 62 or older and the marriage lasted 10 years or more.

Checks for a widowed mother or father getting benefits because she or he is caring for an entitled child will end if the parent remarries.

There is an exception to these general

rules, Kelly said. If an otherwise eligible person receiving benefits as a widow, widower, or adult disabled in childhood marries a person also getting one of these benefits she or he can continue to get benefits.

Benefits will also continue if a person receiving benefits as a widowed mother or father or adult disabled in childhood marries a person getting benefits as a retired or disabled worker. A retired or disabled worker receiving benefits on his or her own record are never affected if he or she marries or divorces. "A person drawing Social Security that is planning on marriage or divorce can contact their Social Security office about what effect such action would have on their Social Security benefits," Kelly said.

More information about how divorce, marriage, or remarriage affect Social Security benefits can be obtained at the Big Sandy Area Social Security Office, located on U.S. 23 between Prestonsburg and Paintsville.

Creel Surveys Important

If you've ever had a fish and wildlife employee approach you while you were out fishing and ask a bunch of questions about how long you've been on the lake. what you're fishing for, what and how many you've caught, then you've participated in something called a "nonuniform probability creel survey.'

These surveys, which are designed to measure angling pressure, fisherman success and a variety of other factors, are important parts of Kentucky's total fishery management efforts, according to Fisheries Director Pete Pfeiffer.

In most cases, these surveys are conducted by creel clerks whose only duty

'If an officer should question you and skip the next four fishermen, it doesn't mean that he thinks you're a suspicious character," Pfeiffer says. "Each survey must be completed within a certain time limit and if there are many fishermen on the lake, the officer must select a representative sample, since he doesn't have time to interview them all.'

SBA Visits Scheduled In County on Mondays

The Small Business Administration (SBA) began Monday weekly visits to Floyd, Pike, Perry, Breathitt and Martin counties to help disaster victims process loan applications.

In each county the SBA representative will be at the Department of Social Insurance. The Floyd county visits will be on each Monday, from 10 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Norman Davis, SBA disaster field director, said the one-day-a-week visits to the five counties will continue until further notice.

Representatives for the agency will be on hand to answer questions and give out applications to homeowners, tenants and business applicants who have suffered losses from the recent storms, floods and tornadoes which struck eastern Kentucky. Advice on how to fill out applications properly also will be available to residents.

Davis urged residents to complete their SBA loan applications as soon as possible rather than to wait for insurance settlements, deeds, income tax reports and other verification documents.

He added that applications may be returned to one of the SBA assistance offices or mailed to SBA, P.O. Box 1618, Paintsville, Ky. 41240. Further information also may be obtained by calling (606) 789-6773, or the toll-free Disaster Hotline at 1-800-422-1044 from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. daily.

the results will be statistically valid. After a season of sampling, the raw data are mathematically expanded to give biologists a picture of the total rishery for each body of water.

There are several ways to express these results, none of which mean very much to anyone except a fisheries biologist. Fishing pressure, for example, is measured in man-acres/hour-one man fishing one hour on one surface acre of water. Harvest is expressed in fish/hour, fish/acre or pounds of fish/acre.

In isolation, these figures don't mean much even to the biologists. But when data from different lakes (or from different years on the same lake) are compared, trends and patterns begin to emerge. Creek surveys, for example, have documented the rapid rise in popularity of bass fishing in the past 10 years and have shown biologists how much and in what ways angling pressures have increased or decreased

Other data, such as the number of men and women anglers, the percentage of resident and non-resident fishermen, the proportion of bank and boat fishermen and enumeration of fishing methods (casting, trolling, still fishing, etc.) also help both biologists and administrators with long and short range planning.

This year, creel surveys will be conducted at the Smithland Pool and tailwaters of the Ohio River and at Barkley. Kentucky, Taylorsville, Herrington, Grayson, Cave Run, Woods Creek, Buckhorn and Martin's Fork Lake. A survey will also be run on the Nolin and Barren rivers in Mammoth Cave National Park.

Since most are comparatively small samples, your chances of being intereviewed are slim. But if an officer or creel clerk does start asking you questions, remember that your answers are helping biologists find ways to improve fishing in the future.

Several families have tied arrangements to head stones with ropes and wires to prevent theft.

'The year we planted shrubs, they even dug them up out of the ground and took them," said one relative.

No arrests have yet been made regarding the actual thefts from the cemetery.

On Sunday, at the local fire station in Juarez, Mexico, the children gather to wait for the round jolly man they call 'El Doctor.'' Almost every Sunday, for the past 18 years, he has been on hand to greet them, coming across the border from El Paso, Texas. His name is Ray G. Villarreal, and he is not a doctor, but he's a very special person to these very special children. They are physically handicapped in one way or another, needing orthopedic shoes, leg braces or artificial limbs, and El Doctor comes with his supplies to fit them, to make them smile and laugh, at no cost. He is a man who knows all about special footwear and all about loving children on both sides of the border.

Long ago, back in 1948, Villarreal came to El Paso from San Antonio, via Brownsville. In all three places he had established stores that specialize in corrective shoes. His wife and three children pitched in; his son Gus is managing one of the stores today. Ray's motto is "Money is round. Spin it in the right direction and it comes back to you." It has come back to him, and he, in turn, aware of the needs of many Mexican children, has spun it in their direction, not only supplying them with corrective footwear but also with food, soap and other necessities. "If you know a crippled child, give me the child's name," is his familiar request. And with the name, he is off and running.

At Christmas, with the aid of the police and sheriffs, he donates several thousand pairs of shoes and gifts to El Paso's needy youngsters, and annually, an even larger number to the children of Juarez. In his volunteer efforts, El Doctor has, for many years, brought Mexican children with the most serious

His friends and neighbors and literally thousands of youngsters and adults on both sides of the border will tell you the spirit of giving is in his heart, his eyes, his laugh. "I feel so good to see a crippled child walk," he says, and then quickly adds, "I could never have done





"Raiders of the Lost Ark" rewrote the book on action adventure films - for nonstop daredevil thrills and stunts, "Raiders" was unex celled. It was the kind of film one might expect from the partnership of reigning box-offce champs George Lucas and

Steven Spielberg. A few other action films since have tried unsuccessfully to challenge "Raiders," most notably two recent James Bond films and the pleasant but tepid thriller "Romancing the Stone." Thus it is left to Messrs. Spielberg and Lucas to outdo themselves, and the result is "Indiana Jones and the Temple of Doom."

In Hollywood terms this film is a "prequel," meaning it is set before the first movie. A minor point as it turns out - for the accent here is not on history but on slam-bang excitement, and no one knows how to squeeze more excitement from a situation than Spielberg and Lucas. "Indiana Jones" is virtually (and at one







Are You or Aren't You Pregnant?

Some women say that they just know. Other women don't even suspect anything until they have missed several menstrual periods. For women, however, there are certain physical changes that do signal pregnancy.

The most obvious sign of pregnancy is a missed menstrual period. If you miss a period and have not been using contraception or using it irregularly, it's a good idea to see your doctor for a pregnancy test and examination. Other common symptoms can be breast tenderness and swelling, fatigue, slight weight gain, an increased need to urinate, and an enlarging abdomen. It's not unheard of to have light spotting or bleeding around the time of your period. So if you think you had a menstrual period but still have signs of pregnancy, make a doctor's appointment.

It's a good idea to wait at least two weeks after your missed menstrual period before having a pregnancy urine test. By that time, if you are pregnant your body will be producing a hormone -human chorionic gonadotropin or HCG-which is measured by both the home pregnancy tests and tests performed in the doctor's office. Although the home pregnancy tests are fairly reliable, they are sensitive to heat and vibration, and there is a slight chance of the test reading "not pregnant" when you are.

Your doctor, in addition to performing a blood or urine test, also will do a pelvic examination. If a woman is pregnant, the opening to her uterus will be slightly bluish and there will be some softening of the uterus.

If you are pregnant, your expected due date will be figured from the date of your last menstrual period since the date of conception is often unknown. Taking the date of your last menstrual period, count back three months then add seven days. If your last menstrual period began on January 1, your estimated due date would be October 8. Of course, any due date is just a good estimate by your doctor, as only a small number of women actually have their baby on that day.

Although your pregnancy isn't apparent to anyone in the early stages and may not seem real to you, it's important to know definitely if you are pregnant. The earlier you know, the earlier you can began prenatal care and begin to take care of yourself, especially by avoiding alcohol, smoking, and unprescribed drugs that aren't good for you or your baby.



Fish, Wildlife Should Survive

Although Kentucky's cold, wet spring floating debris, represent an important has ruined a lot of weekend fishing trips, the long-range effects of all this water on fish populations should be positive. Generally, spawning success and sur-

vival rates are good during rainy years, according to Ted Crowell, assistant director of fisheries for the Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources.

High water levels during the spawning season provide good hiding places for the newly hatched fry, which leads to a high-survival rate, Crowell says. Flooded areas also provide nutrients which increase the basic fertility of the wat er. This in turn promotes the growth

source of food for game fish, so a good spawn of shad will mean more bass, crappie and bluegill several years from now

With many lakes at or near their maximum storage capacity, it will take at least a couple of weeks for the waters to recede to summer pool levels. This slow fall should prolong favorable conditions for fish spawning and survival.

This spring's persistent heavy rains will have some effect on wildlife production also, but biologists don't expect any long-term ill effects on any of our game spec

Although quail nests in low-lying areas have been destroyed by high waters and although some young chicks probably didn't survive bouts of cold wet weather, adult birds should have come through without any major problems and will renest

Later broods will probably have a better survival rate than those which hatch early in the season, so the over-all effects of our unusual weather on population levels shouldn't be too noticeable. Rabbits breed all summer, so any early mortality from flooding or chilling should be compensated for later in the season. About the only game species that might be adversely affected is wild turkey. Year before last, a cold, wet spring was followed by low reproduction, but last year's reproduction under similar conditions was rated good.

But again, the adult birds should survive without any problems, so any setbacks that do occur should be temporary. Usually, in nature's way of doing things, a year or two of poor reproduction is followed by a bumper crop, so we'll just have to be patient and learn to roll with the punches that the weather deals out-the same way that wildlife has learned to cope with all kinds of natural adversity.
