## Three Floyd Men Killed As Auto Hits School Bus

Three Floyd County men are dead as the result of a collision of their auto with a Floyd county school bus last Friday afternoon at the intersection of KY 80 and KY 777, the approach route to near-by Maytown.

The victims are:

—Donald Ray Terry, 23, of Estill, owner of the 1969 model Pontiac Grand Prix two-door in which the three were riding. He died of his injuries at the Morgan County Appalachian Regional Hospital, West Liberty. An ambulance apparently was transporting him to a Lexington hospital when it stopped at West Liberty.

—Jackie Bentley, 27, of Estill, who was dead at the scene of the crash.

—Worley Craft, 60, of Lackey, who died at Our Lady of the Way Hospital, Martin, several hours after the accident.

Slightly injured were Kedrick Blevins, Maytown Elementary School teacher and driver of the bus, and Clarence Robinson, Jr., 13, one of two boys who were on bicycles at the crash site. Young Robinson was hurt, it was said, when the

impact of the crash caused the school bus to slide into him.

State Troopers Wendell Scott and Greg Roberts had not completed their investigation of the tragedy, Tuesday noon, and little of their findings is known.

Blevins, driver of the empty bus, said he had driven out of Turkey Creek and was crossing KY 80 to go to the school at Maytown when the bus was hit. The auto, travelling east, in the direction of Martin, struck the rear end of the bus on its left side with such force that it was driven half its length beneath the bus. The bus itself, though directly crossing KY 80, came to a stop lengthwise on the four-lane highway.

Authorities had not determined Tuesday morning which of its three occupants was driving the car. Coroner Roger Nelson said this may not be known until the results of laboratory tests are announced.

Terry, a native of Michigan, was the son of Mrs. Zelda Thornsberry Hamilton, of Martin, and the late Ray-

mond Terry. He is survived by his mother, his step-father, Vernas Hamilton, of Martin, and three brothers, Ronnie Darrell Terry, Rome City, Ind., Jackie Terry, Memphis, Tenn., and LeRoy Terry, of Lackey. His funeral was held today (Wednesday) at the Upper Quicksand Community Church. Burial was made in the family cemetery on Quicksand.

Bentley was born at Wayland, the son of George and Rosie Isaacs Bentley. In addition to his parents, he is survived by his wife, Lisa Ward Bentley, of California; a daughter, Mindy Bentley, also of California; three brothers and two sisters, Herman Bentley, Jr., of Lackey, Willie and Ross Bentley, both of Wayland, Miss Sandra Rose Bentley and Mrs. Pamela Ross, both of Detroit, Michigan. Funeral services were conducted Tuesday at 11 a.m. from the Martin Branch Free Will Baptist Church, the Revs. Buddy Jones and Green Boyd officiating. Burial was in the Isaacs cemetery at Topmost.

### Despite Broad Form Deed Law...

## State Grants Permit On Contested Tracts

A lawsuit filed by a Floyd family has prompted the administration of Gov. Martha Layne Collins to declare its hand, the state siding with the coal industry in a dispute over whether surface mining officials should issue a permit where a landowner is challenging a coal operator's right to stripmine.

The question has much to do with how easy or hard it will be for a property owner to block stripmining under Kentucky's new broadform deed law.

The issue was pressed in Franklin Circuit Court recently when Maggie Taylor, her son, Marion Taylor, and daughter, Elizabeth Stone, sued the Natural Resources and Environmental Protection Cabinet in an attempt to void a permit issued to Triple Elkhorn Mining Co. to strip their property in Stumbo Hollow near Martin.

The day after the suit was filed an attorney indicated the governor would support the Cabinet in its contention that it should issue permits even in cases where property rights are in dispute.

Prestonsburg attorney J. Logan Griffith, who represents the Taylors in their suit against the Cabinet, said landowners will have trouble stopping stripmining in cases of disputed broadform deeds. That's because the onus will now be on the landowner to seek a court injunction against the coal operator—and chances are the judge will require the landowner to post a substantial bond.

The Taylors have sought, so far unsuccessfully, to have a court affirm their rights over the coal company by virtue of an 83-year-old broadform deed. Even before the passage this year of a state

law saying that broadform deeds permit only those mining methods in use at the time the deeds were signed, the Taylors argued that their deed forbade stripmining because of a handwritten clause on the bottom of the deed requiring that large trees not be cut.

As long as the point is in dispute, say the landowners, the coal company should not be given a stripmining permit. But the Cabinet contends that to hold up a permit would be tantamount to adjudicating the dispute, which is the role of the courts.

Members of the Kentucky Fair Tax Coalition, a group that lobbied for the law restricting broadform deeds, said last week that Gov. Collins had violated her oath of office by failing to enforce the law. "They're enforcing the drunk-driving law and ignoring the broadform deed law," said Chalmer Hicks, of Perry county, who noted that the broadform deed bill took effect on the same day as another statute that strengthened penalties against drunk drivers. "What's the difference?" he asked.

The Floyd County Public Library is taking part in a program to receive a large-print book collection from the state. The library will receive a new collection of about 50 books for a three month period. Anyone who has trouble seeing regular-size print will find the large print books a delight to read, said Librarian Carolyn Traum.

## Highlands Plaza Adds 7 Stores



**SEVEN STORES** have been added to the Highland Plaza shopping center, part of a \$350,000 expansion. The investment reflects a bid by developers to take advantage of the market opened up by Floyd county's steadily growing population and improvements in highways serving this area, said Dick Davis, Highland Plaza manager.

It is not quite coincidental, Richard S. Davis concedes, that the current expansion and facelift at the Highlands Plaza shopping center on University Drive comes at a time when two new shopping malls are under construction on the outskirts of Prestonsburg.

Davis, of Atlanta, is one of three partners in Highland Plaza Associates, owners of the shopping complex. He manages the center here and is overseeing an expansion which has recently added a gas station and seven new stores.

The expansion, which increased commercial space at Highlands Plaza from 84,000 to 94,000 square feet, represents a \$350,000 investment, Davis said.

In addition to the new stores, drainage of the parking lot has been improved and a landscaping project on University Drive is designed to upgrade the general appearance of the center, the developer said.

While business has been good at Highlands Plaza since it opened—Hecks, the largest store there, opened in 1976, the other stores in 1979—the planned opening next year of two malls near the intersection of U.S. 23 and the Mountain Parkway has provided an incentive for the new investment, Davis acknowledged. "We want to meet the competition," he said.

Scheduled for opening in the new year are Prestonsburg Village, a \$10 million mall being constructed by Commonwealth Development Corporation behind Western Sizzlin' restaurant on U.S. 23 and Glyn View Plaza, a \$3 million project being developed by James Arthur Hughes on the Middle Creek road nearby.

The festival has been dedicated, "with warmth and appreciation," to the Festival Band, a group of local musicians who will participate throughout the three-day event, and who play for the love of music and mountain tradition. Its members include Dave Sizemore, Eugene Blackburn, Clifford Brannan, Ollie Wallen, Elmer Fields, L.B. Fairchild, Gheard Martin and others who may join them.

The festival will close Sunday with a program of mountain religious music. This program traces the evolution of church music from its early beginnings

## Jenny Wiley's Grave Sparks New Interest

How come the sudden interest in Jenny Wiley's grave? Mrs. Dorothy Meade wanted to know last week.

For years no one had paid much attention to the last resting place of eastern Kentucky's most celebrated pioneer woman—in the hilltop cemetery above Mrs. Meade's Johnson county home—when, all in the space of a few days, she was "hounded" by callers seeking information about the grave.

Blame Connie Schooler. She wrote a letter to the Lexington Herald-Leader, published last Tuesday, confessing her shame at the sorry state of the graveyard, which lies off KY 581, near the Johnson county community of River, six miles north of Paintsville.

An acquaintance of hers, a teacher of Appalachian literature at a West Virginia college, told her the cemetery is almost impossible to find, coffins are coming up out of the ground, and debris had been bulldozed against the fence enclosing Jenny Wiley's grave.

The historic grave is "sadly, disgracefully neglected," the teacher reported.

Another letter writer followed Sunday with a practical solution to the problem. "The Department of Parks should move the grave to Jenny Wiley State Park," wrote Elsie Kennedy, of Frankfort, who recommended a postcard-campaign to that end.

Not likely. Jenny Wiley's burial place may have generated only limited excitement over the years but nothing is calculated to prick the sensibilities of some Johnson county residents like a suggestion that the grave be moved to Floyd county.

## Murder Charge Against Woman Dismissed Here

The murder charge against a 43-year-old Dana woman has been dismissed in Floyd Circuit Court.

The charge against Geraldine Jarrell was struck from the docket by Circuit Judge Hollie Conley Aug. 22 at the request of Commonwealth's Attorney James R. Allen. In moving to halt prosecution of the case, Allen called it "a perfect case of spousal abuse."

A grand jury alleged Mrs. Jarrell shot her husband, Jackie Lee Jarrell, four times with a semi-automatic pistol on March 17. Jarrell was 48. He died in the couple's Prater Creek home.

Mrs. Jarrell was said to have admitted killing her husband, but claimed it was in self-defense. Police said the two were quarreling at the time of the shooting.

In support of his motion for dismissal, Allen presented evidence that Mrs. Jarrell was beaten by her husband over a period of 25 years. The Jarrells' two children, Belinda Davis, 26, and Jackie Dwayne Jarrell, 21, said they had often seen their father punch their mother in the course of an argument.

Young Jarrell expressed surprise that his mother knew how to use the alleged murder weapon, a .22-caliber Luger belonging to his father. Jarrell usually kept the weapon hidden and stored the cartridge clip separately for safety reasons, his son said.

Dr. Robert P. Granacher, Jr., a Lexington psychiatrist who treated Mrs. Jarrell for depression after the shooting, said he believed she was "a victim of prolonged and extensive spouse abuse" and that she was probably afraid for her life on numerous occasions, including the time her husband was shot.

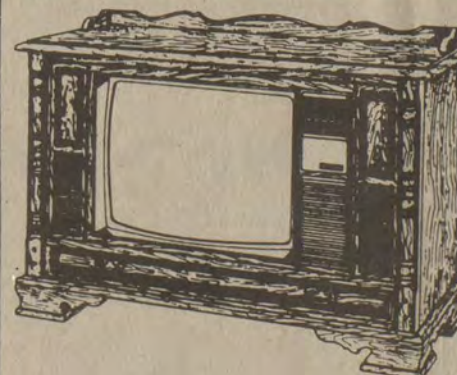

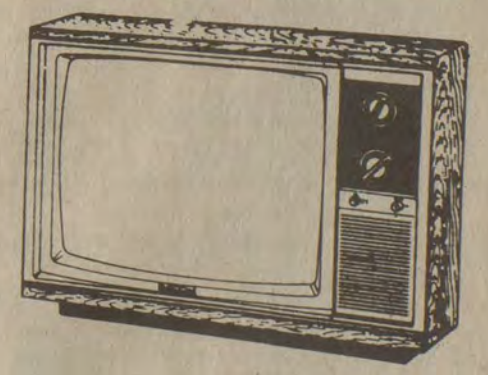

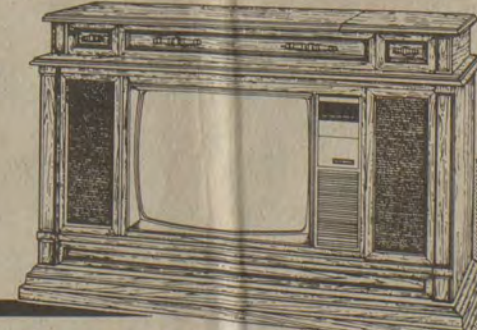

### HRMC Expansion 87% Completed

Other departments to be expanded in the addition at the Medical Center are the Intensive/Coronary Care Unit, Surgery, Radiology, Laboratory, Physical Therapy, and Medical Records. Forty-seven new patient beds will also be opened on the second floor of the addition.

"We are proud of how smoothly the construction has progressed and have high praise for the local workers and contractors," said Clarence C. Traum, administrator. "Due to everyone's hard work and the cooperation of our employees and patients, we will soon be able to better serve the residents of the Big Sandy."





## Let's Take Care of Our Own

Publication of a Lexington woman's letter describing the sad condition of the grave of Jenny Wiley, pioneer heroine, has awakened many of us to a belated sense of guilt.

It serves no purpose for us now to point the accusing finger at any individual or group for this shameful neglect. We are all guilty—some more guilty than others, because they were more aware of the situation than others, but in greater or lesser degree we all share the shame.

Now that the condition of the grave has become public knowledge, there may be heard the claim that the state should be responsible. But this is a plain case of begging the issue. Jenny Wiley is our heroine, not the state's. Whatever respect is due her, now long dead, is to be paid by us, the people of the Big Sandy Valley, the place where her dramatic exploit took place and where she lived and died and now rests.

The Big Sandy Historical Society, or some other respected group, should now assume responsibility for the care of the grave, and the people of Johnson, Floyd and other Big Sandy counties should provide the cost of continuing care.

Whatever we do will, of course, mean nothing to Jenny Wiley, but it will do much for our collective self-respect and give us the right to say again, truthfully and proudly, that Eastern Kentucky would prefer to take care of its own.

## Kentucky Crops Remain Mostly In Good Condition But Need Rain

Kentucky crops remain in mostly good condition despite inadequate rainfall.

"The crop condition remains good thanks to moderate temperatures during the past week," says Agriculture Commissioner David E. Boswell.

Rainfall amounts last week (Aug. 20-25) varied from 2.28 inches at the Quicksand reporting station in Breathitt county to none at four other reporting stations. Twenty-eight of the 35 reporting stations have recorded below-average rainfall for the past four weeks.

Statewide, soil moisture is reported 67 percent short and 33 percent adequate.

"Corn and pastures are suffering most," Boswell said. "Corn is advancing toward maturity in mostly good condition, but it is under some dry weather stress. Pastures in many areas are beginning to fade due to the dry conditions."

Corn silage harvest should be under way this week, and a few early planted fields could also be harvested for grain this week.

Soybeans are continuing to develop in fair to mostly good condition.

"Reporters also rate the tobacco crop in mostly good condition," Boswell said.

"Burley acreage is now 84 percent topped as compared to 43 percent last year."

All Kentucky crops are ahead of last year's development, but they are still behind the average.

"Basically, the rains we have had have enabled the crops to hold on, but we aren't guaranteed a good harvest yet. We still need more rain before farmers can relax," Boswell said.

Opinions differ as to how bad conditions are at the gravesite and there is an even wider divergence over who is responsible for its upkeep.

Although it has been temporarily removed during highway construction, a sign to the grave usually stands at the mouth of Wiley Branch, on U.S. 23 about a mile south of the Johnson-Lawrence county line. Another approach, from Paintsville by way of Tom's Creek, is also marked clearly, as is the entrance itself, on property owned by the River community club and volunteer fire department.

Tracing the path to the old family cemetery on top of the hill is trickier but no great feat. A rusty turnstile suggests tourist traffic was once heavier but even now, neighbors said, the site attracts a steady trickle of visitors in the warmer months.

Someone has taken potshots at several signs along the trail and the path itself is badly eroded. But the grave of Kentucky's illustrious pioneer, lying under the shelter of a fine oak, is clearly marked by a tall granite headstone and enclosed by a chain-link fence.

"Jenny Wiley, 1760-1831," the legend reads, and a bronze plaque affixed to the stone outlines the story of her life, including her capture by Indians—called "savages" here—and subsequent escape.

A bronze plaque was mounted on the headstone marking Jenny Wiley's grave in 1965. An inscription on it reads:

"Heroic pioneer mother. Captured by Indians, October 1, 1789 at Walker's Creek, Va. Witnessed the slaying of her brother and five children by savages. Was held captive for several months on Little Mud Lick Creek in the present Johnson County. She escaped from the Indians to Harmon Station at Block House Bottom and was later united with her husband, Thomas Wiley, in Virginia.

"Mrs. Wiley returned to Johnson County with her husband and a cabin was built near this site about the year 1800, where they reared a family of five children. Jenny Wiley died in 1831."

That is the monument erected in 1955 at the urging of the Big Sandy Historical Society. Behind it, protected by an in-elegant steel cage, is the original sandstone marker, now weathered to a fraction of its original bulk.

The site is unkempt. A small American flag planted in the ground in front of the grave marker is faded almost beyond recognition. Someone has discarded a styrofoam cup nearby. And, as the Lexington letter-writer noted in disgust, dead brush is piled thick against the fence enclosing the monument.

"I wouldn't call it an absolute disgrace or anything," commented Leon Russell, superintendent of Jenny Wiley State park, who made an informal inspection of the gravesite Friday, "though it's bad enough."

Disgrace or not, it is by no means clear who is responsible for it. Mrs. Meade insists that when her late father, Joe Stambaugh, gave to the state a six-foot easement to provide public access to the site, it was on condition the state maintain it.

Bob Bender, a state Department of Parks official, said the legislature in 1960 authorized the parks department to spend up to \$1000 to mark the grave and the transportation department up to \$500 to put a fence around it. But he said there is no record on file of the state's agreeing to maintain the site.

Guy B. Meade, Dorothy Meade's son, owns the property now. A Paintsville landscaping contractor, he insists the state has reneged on a commitment to keep the place up. "As far as I know they've never set foot on that hill," he complained. Over the years, Meade says, it has fallen to him to clean up after visitors who have littered the area, trespassed on private property, and sometimes partied all night.

Although the situation has improved since the neighboring community club put up a gate two years ago, Meade said he was "tired of the motorcycle riders, drunks and heathens" who used to congregate at the site. In the course of clearing a house seat on the property last year, he re-routed the path leading to the cemetery and pushed the cleared debris up against its perimeter. Both measures were designed to give his family some privacy, he explained.

Meade said he would have no objections to the grave being moved—for a price. "It's not going to leave for under \$25,000, I can tell you that now," he said.

It is not going to leave under any circumstances, if Ed Hazelett has his way. "We were totally opposed to that 19 years ago and we're totally opposed to it today," said Hazelett, a former president of the Big Sandy Historical Society and a prime mover in the group that had the River site more permanently marked in 1965.

There were 500 to 600 people at the dedication ceremony, Hazelett said. "The Floyd county people had wanted it moved there then and we cranked up a big campaign to keep it here."

Dorothy Meade, who would herself shed no tears if the historic grave were moved, acknowledged that the idea would not sit well with some of her neighbors. "You know how it is," she said. "Floyd county has always been a rival."

## Couple Cleared Of Arson Count In Store Blaze

A circuit court jury took only five minutes to decide last Wednesday that Millis and Verdie Hamilton were not guilty of setting fire to their liquor store.

The couple were owners of V. and H. Carryout at Beaver until it caught fire during the night last Sept. 19, was put out by the Mud Creek Volunteer Fire Department, caught fire again around 4 a.m. the same night, and burned to the ground.

They were charged with arson, the prosecutor alleging they set the second fire themselves with a view to receiving a substantial insurance settlement.

An insurance company later paid them \$21,000 for their loss—a fact that may have helped convince the jury that they were not to blame for it, said their attorney, Gary Johnson. "Who has ever heard of an insurance company paying a claim there's any doubt about?" he asked.

Other defense witnesses supported the Hamiltons' claim that they had nothing to do with the blaze.

William "Running Bear" Ray, of Grethel, said he was hunting squirrels when he noticed the fire and alerted the Hamiltons, who lived next door to their store. They were in night attire and appeared to have been sleeping, he testified.

Shirley Newsome, of Mink Branch, who said he was a former bootlegger who tried to turn to legitimate liquor sales when the county went wet, said Millis Hamilton had refused his offer to buy the store. That indicated the store was prospering and the Hamiltons had no motive to burn it, the defense argued.

In an unrelated case, David Hamilton, 20, of Galveston, was granted shock probation Monday, after serving a month of a one-year sentence for burglary.

Hamilton and another, Billy D. Hamilton, 23, were accused of breaking into the home of Davis Evans at Grethel last Sept. 9. The older man pleaded guilty to a charge of criminal trespass and was sentenced to 60 days in jail.

David Hamilton, who was said to have stolen two watches and two rings from the house, was charged with second degree burglary. He pleaded guilty to third degree burglary, a lesser charge, and received the one-year sentence on a recommendation of the Commonwealth.

(Shock probation is sometimes given first-time offenders, on the theory that the shock of imprisonment may be enough to deter them from further crime.)

## Board Member Has Opposition

Only one of three incumbent Floyd school board members will face a challenge in November. Henry Douglas (Doug) Bailey, of McDowell, will be running against McDowell physician and three-term board member Dr. Mary Hall in the fourth educational division.

In the third division, Fred Newsome, operator of a television antenna company, is unopposed, as is James Arville Duff, Hueysville grocery, in the fifth division.

The deadline for filing was August 28.

Bailey, 44, a switchman for South Central Bell, is married with four children. His two oldest children are graduates of McDowell high school; the two younger children attend Mountain Christian Academy, a private school near Martin.

Dr. Hall, a board member since 1972, shook off a challenge by Carson Akers four years ago, winning that race by 1658 votes to 1271.

## New DAV Nat'l Commander Is Inspiration To Members

Merely surviving after a Viet Cong land mine ripped both legs and an arm from his body just wasn't enough for Chad Colley.

He wanted a full life. Handicapping war wounds, no matter how severe, weren't going to stand in the way of this Arkansas businessman, who was recently elected national commander of the 900,000-member Disabled American Veterans (DAV).

The determination that sets off life's winners was obvious in a letter Colley wrote to his wife, Betty Ann, just three days after he was nearly killed.

"Even though I'm banged up pretty bad, I'm still me," he wrote from a hospital bed in Vietnam. "I can put my loss of limbs into an asset. I have a big challenge to undertake now. I'll need your help—not your sympathy... By all means, don't start feeling sorry for me. I'm feeling sorry for those who didn't make it."

A surprisingly up-beat tone for a man who'd just lost three limbs, a man who still faced the danger of death! But, speaking of the Viet Cong, he joked, "It's funny that these people didn't realize how tough I am."

Colley will need that good-humored optimism and that winning determination as he leads the DAV, America's third largest veterans' organization, during the coming year.

"The heat's on to cut veterans' programs," he explained. "With powerful members of both political parties demanding cuts in federal spending, including programs for disabled vets, we're going to have a battle on our hands no matter who wins or loses in the November elections."

"I'm determined to make sure the Disabled American Veteran wins that battle. The plan is to build our membership strength, passing the million-member mark as soon as possible. And we're going to make the DAV's service and legislative programs even more effective than they've already proven to be."

While studying math at North Georgia College, he quickly became a campus leader, listed in Who's Who Among Students in American Universities. As a senior, he received the coveted All Sports Award. And when he left the college, he was honored as a Distinguished Military Graduate, and received a commission in 1966.

July 21, 1968, found Colley leading a company of 101st Airborne Division men on a mission 45 miles northwest of Saigon when a land mine explosion threw the young lieutenant into the air. He remembers that he felt no shock or horror after falling back into the crater left by the blast; he was only glad he was still alive.



A year later, Colley was working as a real estate broker. Since then, his career has taken him to the positions of sales manager for the largest home builder in western Arkansas and loan department manager for a federal savings & loan association.

Today, he owns and operates a mobile home and land development company near Fort Smith, Ark., doing business throughout the northern part of the state. But he plans to live in Washington, D.C. during his one-year term at the helm of the nonprofit DAV.

Religious, civic, social and political involvements have always characterized Colley's active life. Recognition of his contributions in these areas are numerous. The Daughters of the American Revolution awarded him their Honor Medal. The U.S. Jaycees recognized him as a finalist in their national oratorical contest. And he's just completing his fourth year as a board director on the governing body of his hometown, Barling, Ark.

But, perhaps the most meaningful recognition came in 1970 when the DAV honored Colley as the national Outstanding Disabled Veteran of the Year.

With his election as DAV national commander, Colley replaces Dennis A. Joyner, who also lost three limbs in the Vietnam War.

## Laurel, Wayne Counties Sites Of ABC Raids

Agents from the Kentucky Department of Alcoholic Beverage Control recently raided 11 alleged bootlegging operations in Laurel county and destroyed more than \$300,000 worth of marijuana in Wayne county, according to ABC Commissioner Edward A. Farris.

Fifteen ABC agents seized more than 4,000 cans of beer, 108 bottles of liquor and eight \$20 bags of marijuana, said Les Cole, ABC supervisor of field agents.

ABC agents, assisted by Kentucky State Police, arrested 13 persons in the London area as a result of the raids. Those arrested were charged with possession of alcoholic beverages in dry territory and with possession of marijuana. They were taken to the Laurel county jail and arraigned in district court. The effort completed a four-month investigation by Department officials.

In another raid, state ABC agent Russell Stockton and Wayne county sheriff Joe Conn destroyed more than 200 marijuana plants valued at more than a quarter-million dollars in the South Central Kentucky area. The plants, already bagged for sale, were found in a residential area near Monticello.

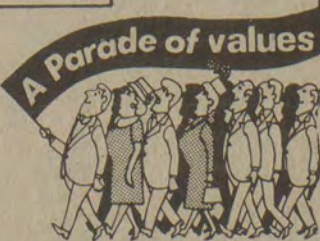

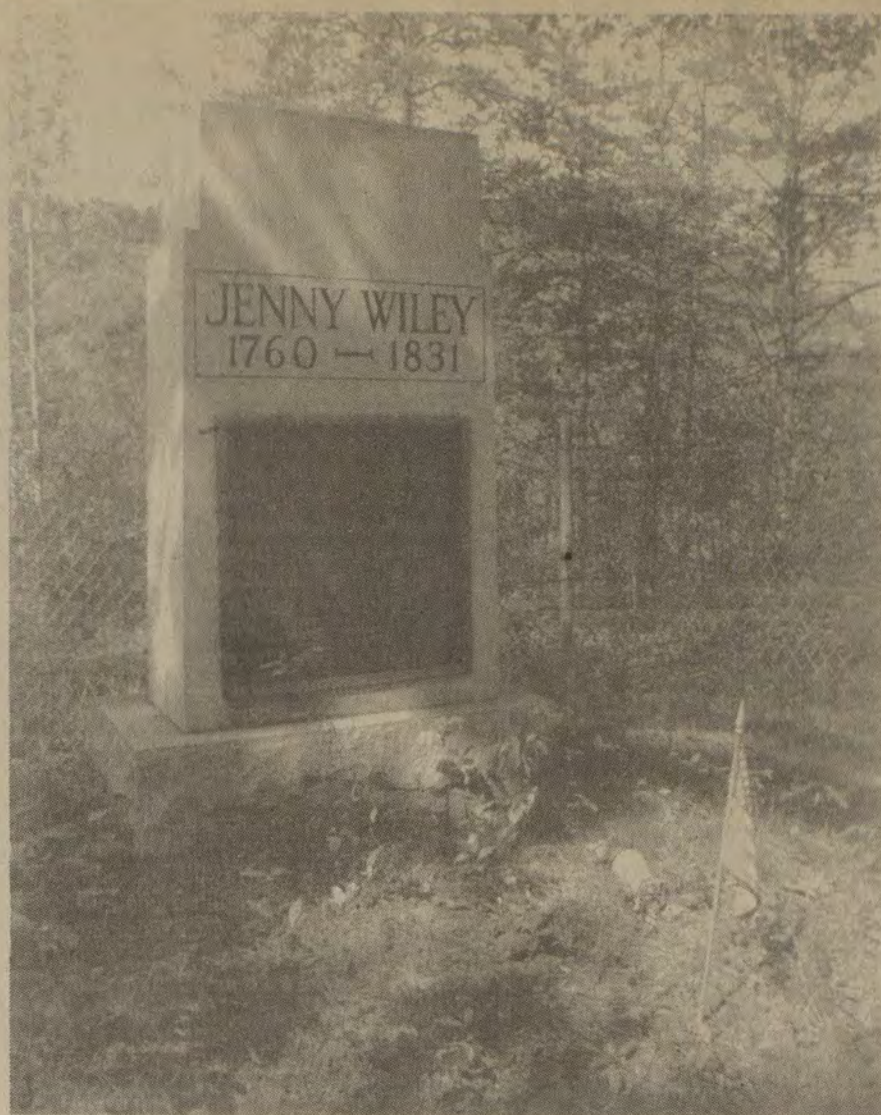

Some, critical of the neglected condition of the historic grave, have revived a suggestion that it be moved to Jenny Wiley State Park. But some Johnson county residents are known to be adamantly opposed to the idea.

Dulcimer Convention  
Slated at Pineville

Wooden bagpipe and hogfiddle are two names for it in the mountains of eastern Kentucky. Its European ancestors go by names like Langspiel and Hummel. It is a lap, plucked or mountain dulcimer and it, along with the hammered dulcimer, is the reason for the Great American Dulcimer Convention at Pine Mountain State Park, Pineville, September 27-28.

"The convention came about just as people started re-discovering the dulcimer," says Dick Albin, co-founder of the event. He and his partner, Anne, started the Dulcimer Convention seven years ago. "When we first began playing dulcimers," Albin explains, "people would ask if they were some sort of lap guitar."

The instrument was brought to the mountains by the early settlers in that part of Kentucky and like them trace its roots to the British Isles. Today dulcimers are being made all over the country. Models are even exported back to Kentucky from factories in Korea.

Featured this year at Pine Mountain are Jean Ritchie, Fred Meyer, Nancy and Blake Barker, Dick and Anne Albin, and Jay Round who are returning to the festival. Newcomers Just Friends, Bob Hutchison and Holly King, and In The Woods have been added this year.

The Parks Department and the Kentucky Arts Council are expanding this year's convention to include four school concerts in the Bell county schools and to host a noon concert by Celtic band, In The Woods, in Pineville. Jean Ritchie will perform at the Pineville library at 3:30 p.m. All of this is scheduled Friday, September 28. Librarian, Ron Day, of Pineville, coordinated these concerts.

Jean Ritchie is this year's recipient of the Milner Award given each year by the Kentucky Arts Council to the "outstanding Kentucky artist of the year." "Jean has done more than anyone I can think of to bring the dulcimer out of Appalachia and make it known to the rest of America," said Anne Albin.

The Dulcimer Convention is more than a festival. Although the emphasis is on the evening concerts, the convention offers lessons for those interested in lap and hammered dulcimer and workshops as varied as spoon playing and a dulcimer building to basic jigs and reels. There will be a square dance for beginners and experts conducted by State Park Naturalist, Ed Henson, Saturday afternoon.

Nancy and Blake Barker, musicians from Balltown, Kentucky, and Bob and Holly King, of Lexington, will tour area schools doing concerts and will perform in the convention. The Barkers specialize in children's concerts. They also build hammered dulcimers, host the Kentucky Music Weekend and do community concerts. They will be featured on the Friday evening concert.

The music of the dulcimer is as varied as the people who play them. Fred Meyer is an innovator on the dulcimer and plays styles which range from folk to bluesy bottle neck. He will lead a workshop on percussion featuring spoons and bone playing. Holly King will assist him.

Jay Round and Just Friends play Michigan style hammered dulcimer where the instrument is called the "lumberjack's piano." Jay has performed all over the country and worked for awhile as bass player for Grandpa Jones. His records range from traditional songs to an album of big band swing music.

Just Friends is a quartet of women from Pontiac, Michigan, who play guitar, two hammered dulcimers, bass, harp, banjo, mandolin and sing. Cecelia Horodko of Just Friends is the first fulltime dulcimer player at Greenfield Village in Dearborn since Edwin Baxter who was hired by Henry Ford in the 20's.

Just Friends has performed extensively in the Detroit area and in festivals in Ohio. They were featured at the Detroit Institute of Arts "Brunch with Bach."

The Dulcimer Convention encourages people who are just starting to perform with an "open stage" concert on Thursday evening. Bob Hutchison played on that stage last year and will perform and do dulcimer lessons as part of the convention this year.

Naturalist Barry Howard directs the events at the park. The weekend includes crafts displays and sales and tours of the park conducted by Howard.

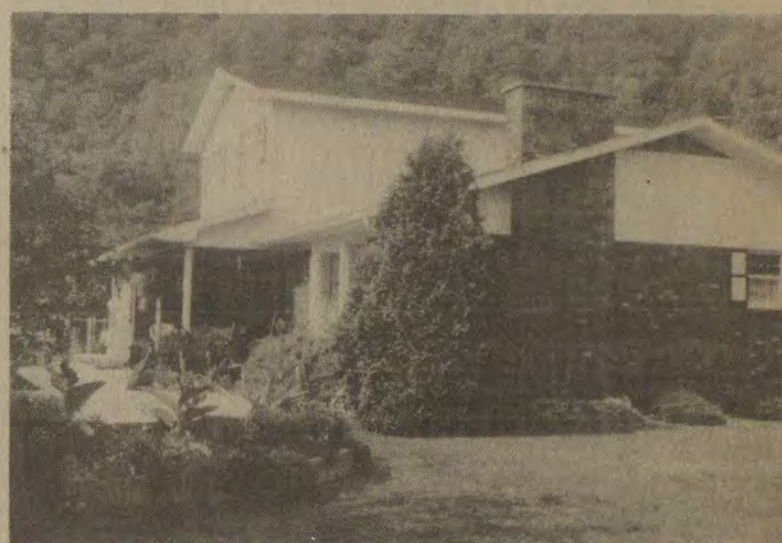

## Human Resources Offers Help With Checking Day Care Centers

Recent reports of sexual abuse in day care centers in several states, including Kentucky, have raised public concerns about child safety in such facilities. According to officials of the Cabinet for Human Resources, Kentucky parents of preschool age children can get help in checking the services and service records of such programs.

Inspector General William Gardner said there are about 1,000 licensed day care centers in Kentucky as well as a substantial number of unreported centers operating without a license. "The first thing a parent should check in selecting a day care program is the license and the inspection reports on file at the facility," he said. "These reports are open to the public and specify what areas, if any, the day care center has fallen short in during past inspections as well as what the operators did to correct any problems."

State regulations on day care centers are enforced by the cabinet's Division of Licensing and Regulation. Director Sara Pratt said, "Our inspections cover such areas as the number of staff per child, the dietary programs, health and sanitation, activity and child development programs and the safety of the physical facility to children. In licensed day care centers these regulations are in effect strictly for the protection of the children. However, an unlicensed facility usually has no outside monitoring, so there is no assurance that these standards are being met."

The Division for Licensing and Regulation has offices in Frankfort, Hopkinsville, Lexington, London and Louisville where records are kept on all licensed day care centers in Kentucky. Records are also kept on unlicensed operations which have been reported to state officials and are under investigation. Pratt said, "We have a directory available from which we can provide parents with the names of the approved day care centers in their community. We don't recommend one program over another, but we can provide parents with some background on centers they are interested in using."

Pratt offered the following tips to parents considering day care placement for their children:

—Visit several programs to compare the services offered and to determine which center may best meet the needs of your child.

—Talk with the teachers and other non-administrative personnel about their feelings on what is important for children to receive from a day care program.

—Talk with some children already enrolled at the center and with their parents about the services offered at the center.

—Look at items such as meal preparation, activities which the children take part in and the relationships between the children and the center staff.

—Ask yourself how you would feel if you had to spend several hours each day in this particular program.

Gardner said the public can be of great assistance to his staff in its work to inspect licensed day care centers and bring unlicensed centers into compliance with state requirements. "We are constantly on the lookout for new day care programs opening as well as for those in operation we don't already know about," he said. "In most cases, people who operate unlicensed day care centers are unaware of both the license requirements and the standards of care which must be met. Normally when we contact these center operators they will seek a license."

In Kentucky, any day care program serving four or more children must have a license and meet the standards of care.

### Kentucky Fishing Report

Hot August weather has affected anglers' luck at most of Kentucky's largest lakes. The lake-by-lake rundown, as compiled by conservation officers with the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources:

**KENTUCKY:** White bass slow fishing jumps; black bass slow on crank baits and plastic worms off points; catfish fair on cutbait; clear, falling slowly at two feet below summer pool and 80°.

**BARKLEY:** Black bass slow on artificial worms and crank baits casting points; white bass slow trolling jumps; clear, falling slowly at two feet below summer pool and 80°.

**BARREN:** Black bass slow on plastic worms and crank baits; white bass fair at night under lights and trolling during day; catfish good on live shad around shoreline; clear, stable at summer pool and 82°.

**NOLIN:** Black bass slow on plastic worms; bluegill slow on worms and crickets; clear, falling slowly at three feet below summer pool and 82°.

**ROUGH RIVER:** Crappie fair on minnows over submerged cover; clear, stable at summer pool and 82°.

**TAYLORSVILLE:** Black bass fair on plastic worms and crank baits over stick-ups and drop-offs; bluegill good on mealworms and crickets around stick-ups; clear, stable at summer pool and 78°.

**HERRINGTON:** No report available.

**GREEN RIVER:** Black bass slow to fair on plastic worms near drop-offs and points; white bass slow to fair in scattered jumps and by trolling; bluegill fair on worms over cover; crappie fair on minnows over submerged cover; clear, stable at summer pool and 82°.

**LAUREL:** Black bass fair on spinner baits and plastic worms early and late in day off points; trout fair on worms and cheese at night; clear, falling slowly at seven feet below power pool and 81°.

**CAVE RUN:** Muskie slow trolling main channels; black bass slow on crank baits late in evening and at night; clear, stable at summer pool and 79°.

**BUCKHORN:** No report available.

**GRAYSON:** Crappie fair on minnows (6-10 feet deep) over cover; black bass slow using shallow running lures off rocky points; bluegill fair (6-8 feet deep) over cover; clear, falling slowly at 2½ feet below summer pool and 82°.

**DEWEY:** Crappie fair on minnows (6-8 feet deep) over tree tops; clear, stable at summer pool and 82°.

**FISHTRAP:** Crappie slow on minnows (6-8 feet deep) over cover; in tailwaters, trout good on cheese and corn; clear, stable at summer pool and 82°.

He said farmers who did not plant program crops this year should submit a "zero" report to protect their base and future farm program eligibility.

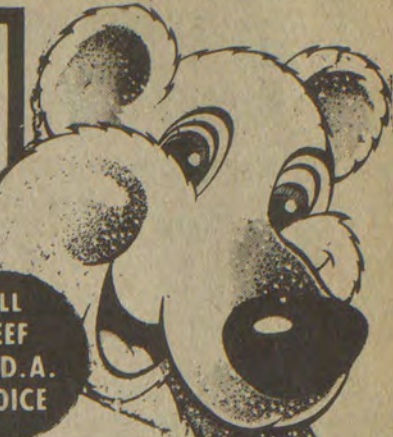
Acreage reports currently on file indicate that 38 farms in Floyd county are certified and eligible for 1984 farm program benefits.

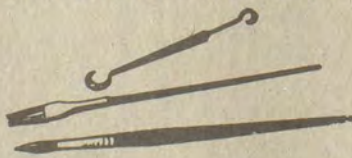

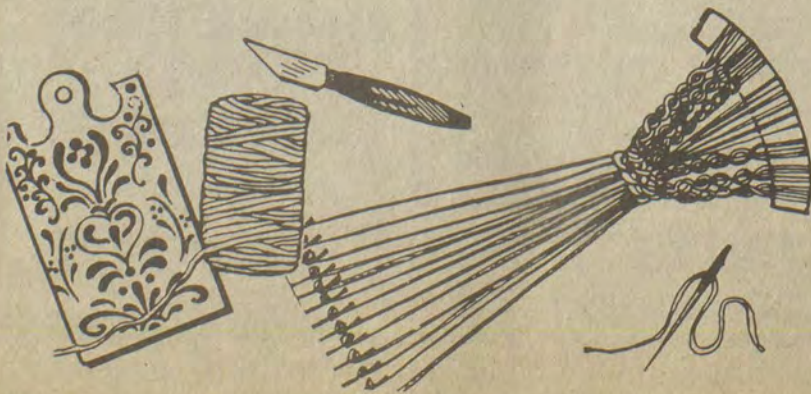

The proper use of prescription drugs is a complex subject, but Highlands Regional Medical Center is trying to make it simpler to understand. The HRMC Pharmacy has begun a new program to provide drug information pamphlets when prescriptions are filled. They are designed to help patients use their medications correctly and safely. There is no cost for this service.

Pharmacy Director Tim Dotson says the new pamphlets give "every patient access to standard information that they need. It's an easy way to review correct procedures with a patient."

A national pharmacy association recently developed the information pamphlets. Each pamphlet includes simply-worded information about the medicine, what should be done before its use, how to use it properly, what precautions need to be taken and what possible side effects exist. The side-effects section also specifies which are serious enough to be reported to the doctor and which will probably not require medical attention. Even pronunciation instructions are included for tougher names.

Perhaps the most innovative feature is the section explaining medication times. It displays a 24-hour clock, with numbers that are circled by the pharmacist to remind patients when to take their medication. Discussing medication times with the pharmacist prompts many patients to ask additional questions such as what to do if a dosage is missed.

There are different information pamphlets for 37 major drug categories, each one adaptable to any specific drug in its category. Dotson says the array of different drugs and the variety of instructions with each can be a problem for patients. "Many people can't remember all the information the doctor told them. These new forms are a simple but effective way to help patients do just that."

Among common drugs for which the new system will be helpful are penicillins, antibiotics, heart, and high blood pressure medications.

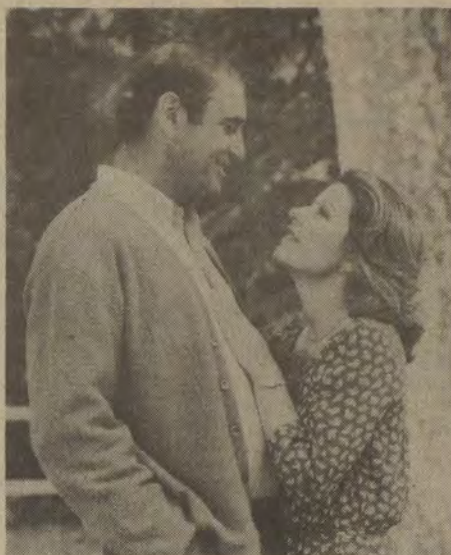

### Less Violence Said In Schools Today

"Although discipline continues to be cited most frequently by respondents as the top problem with which their local schools must contend, parents who now have children enrolled in the public schools mention this problem significantly less often than in 1983," George Gallup wrote in analyzing his organization's 1984 survey of Americans' attitudes toward the public schools, shortly before his death last month.

Gallup's interpretation is supported by the president of Phi Delta Kappa—the educators' fraternity that financed the survey—and by the president of the nation's largest education organization, the National Education Association.

"Discipline is not a serious problem in most public schools today," says Jerome Kopp, Phi Delta Kappa president. "I believe that administrators and teachers began putting programs in place in the late '70s to deal with violence and discipline problems. As the public took a close look at the schools during the past year due to the numerous reports on education, they found lots of improvements. The public's perception caught up to reality."

Parents with children in public schools named discipline as the schools' biggest problem 23 percent of the time in the 1984 Gallup education poll. This is a drop of about one-third, or 29 percent, from a year ago.

"We have maintained for some time that the public schools aren't blackboard jungles," says Mary Hatwood Futrell, president of the 1.7-million-member NEA. "We hope the public continues to take a close look at their schools."

Futrell points to a new NEA survey showing that 68 percent of teachers are satisfied with student behavior in their classes. And an even higher number, 85 percent, say their schools provide a safe and orderly environment.

NEA surveyed 2,000 classroom teachers in May on key topics that have been in the limelight during the past year's national dialogue on education. This survey found fewer instances of classroom violence than a similar poll taken four years earlier. Some 12.9 percent of the teachers surveyed last spring said their personal property had been stolen at school, while 5.5 percent reported that personal items had been intentionally damaged. In 1980, the figures were 15.4 percent for stolen personal property and 7.2 percent for damaged property.

Physical attacks on teachers are down as well. In the 1984 poll, some 3.7 percent said they had been assaulted by a student within the past year; in 1980, 5.2 percent of teachers reported attacks.

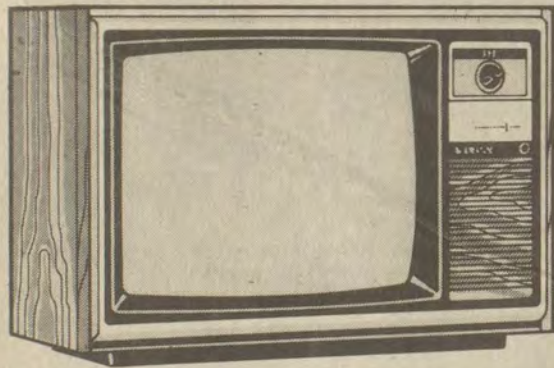

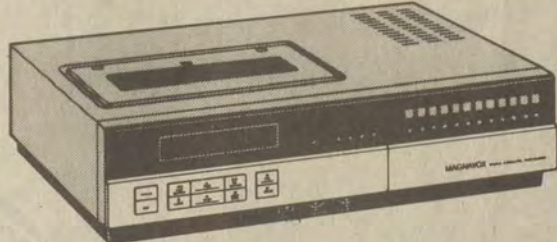

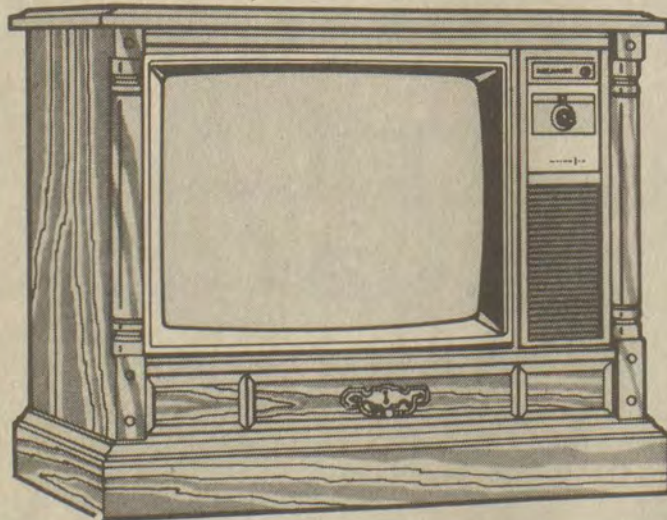

## Wood In Our Lives: Products from the National Forests

### The Chemistry of Trees in our Everyday Lives

Chemicals in trees help give us radial tires and vanilla ice cream. Also dietetic bread and, if you're not on a diet, after-dinner mints.

Then, too, there are Vitamins A and E, menthol in shaving preparations, the fragrances of roses and lemons and an adhesive which makes sticky tape stick.

All of this is according to chemists at the Forest Products Laboratory at Madison, Wisconsin.

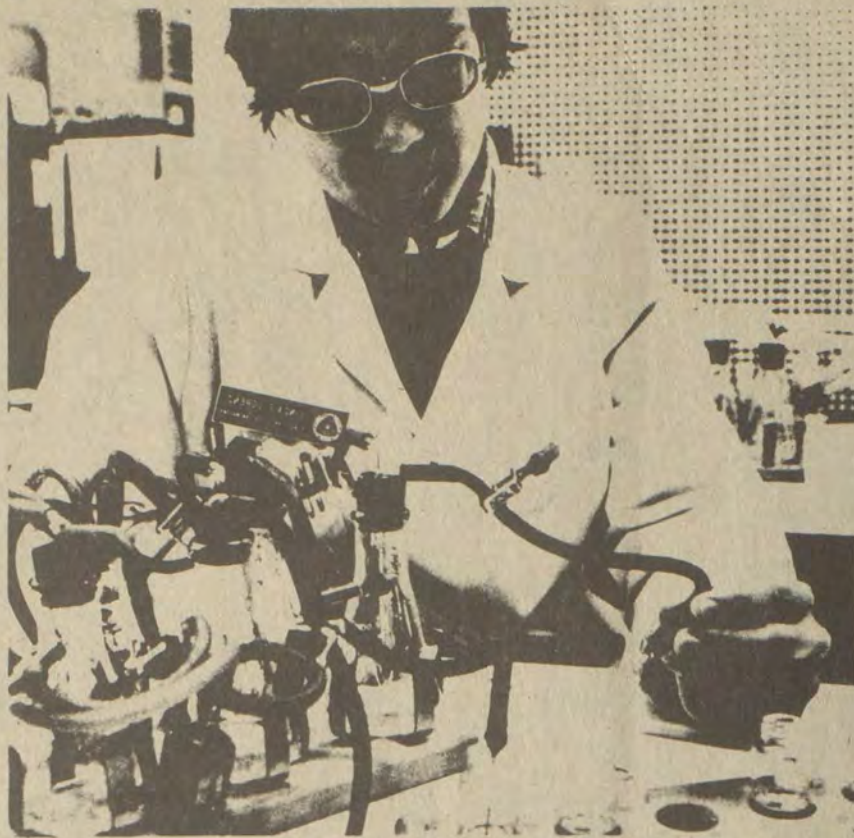
In addition, silvichemicals, known as wood-chemicals, give us charcoal briquets, from the carbon in trees. Rosin is used by baseball players and bowlers for ball control. And, but not at the bottom of the list, is chewing gum.

Among the products and by-products of National Forests, administered by the Forest Service of the U.S. Department of Agriculture, radial tires are one of the biggest commodities using a chemical from trees.

"The most important chemical in trees is cellulose," explains Dr. John Rowe of the Forest Products Laboratory. "Cellulose is used in dissolving pulps to make rayon and it is rayon which is used in the tire cords in the sidewalls of radials.

"We cannot find a synthetic for rayon for sidewalls of radials that is superior," says Dr. Rowe.

Rayon, used in wearing apparel, too, is especially popular these days, despite competition, for use by rock groups. This is due to its silkiness, says Dr. Rowe. It's also long-lasting, he adds. "I have a rayon shirt

that's 45 years old. It won't wear out!"

Another end use of cellulose is as a non-nutritive filler in some dietetic breads, says Dr. Rowe.

Lignin in trees is converted into vanilla and Dr. Rowe estimates there's enough lignin so there'll never be a shortage of vanilla flavoring for ice cream. He says approximately 90 percent of our vanilla ice cream is flavored by converted lignin.

Flavors, synthesized from turpentine, are peppermint, spearmint and chocolate mints, he says. It's also from turpentine that we derive rose and lemon fragrances.

Dr. Rowe, project leader of Chemical Utilization of Woods, says turpentine, one of the most interesting chemicals in trees, comes

from pine trees located mainly in the southeastern part of the U.S.

Dr. Duane Zinkel, research chemist at the Forest Products Lab, says it's not generally well-known, but that Vitamins A, for eyesight, and Vitamin E, for general well-being, are manufactured from turpentine chemicals. From turpentine, too, we get the sticky substance for tape, pine oil for cleaning purposes and menthol. Menthol not only goes into shaving preparations but into cigarettes and cosmetics.

As for chewing gum, Dr. Zinkel says in the 1860s, it was simply a matter of taking soft gum off spruce trees and chewing it. Rosin derivatives are used in part today, along with other ingredients. Now, too, there are all those flavors.
